PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The new culvert works at Frodesley have disrupted local traffic through much of September and unfortunately were extended well into October. The Parish Council pressed for better handling of the school bus arrangements and also for weekend working to be introduced. This resulted in the road reopening on October 18th in accordance with a revised schedule. The situation was made considerably worse with the closure of the bridge at Dorrington which was hit by an agricultural vehicle. The road is too narrow to allow a temporary barrier to be installed quickly. The bridge is a Grade II listed structure so permanent repairs will take some time. However, a temporary solution which does not impinge on the carriageway is in hand.

The council last met on 19th September. The main items discussed were as follow. Shropshire Councillor, Dan Morris,

advised that Shropshire Council had agreed to work with Monmouthshire, Powys and Herefordshire Councils, forming Marches Forward Partnership with the aim of bidding together for funding for transport and other crossborder projects. Dan also advised that only one Council building (Whitchurch

Library) had been identified as having RAAC concrete in its construction.

Dan also advised that Shropshire Council are planning to build a pyrolosis plant in Shrewsbury. This will use waste timber to produce gas for fuel and a byproduct, char, which is used for fertilizer and soil improvement. Three sites are being considered.

Following reports at the last meeting regarding overgrown local footpaths and bridleways information is being collected so that action can be taken regarding any which are not cleared this autumn during seasonal hedge cutting.

Work on traffic calming (village gateways, signage, etc.) has continued and a short report with recommendations was approved and has now been passed to Shropshire Council highways department. The department has confirmed that works for Frodesley are included in the work plan for the current year. Assuming that highways department approves the plans, it should be possible for the village gateways to be installed in the first part of 2024.

The Parish Council gave approval for continued support of Village Views,

and to cover the costs of a CPR and Defibrillator demonstration to be run at Pitchford Village Hall ahead of the October Pub Night. The Frodesley bus shelter replacement was also approved along with refurbishment of the Parish noticeboards. The bus shelter will be replaced over the school summer break in 2024.

Since the meeting the Local Government Boundary Commmission have issued their final report.
Comments on their draft recommendations seem to have been noted and Burnell Ward will not be combined with Bayston Hill. However, Cardington will move to Corvedale Ward, All Stretton/Smethcott/ Woolstaston are now going to be in the Bishops Castle Ward and the Parishes of Hughley/Kenley/Church Preen will now join Burnell.

MESSAGE FROM COUNCILLOR DAN MORRIS SHROPSHIRE COUNCILLOR FOR BURNELL

Shropshire Council confirmed a groundbreaking agreement with other English and Welsh councils at its Cabinet in early September. A proposed 'Marches Forward Partnership' sees Shropshire Council work with Herefordshire Council, Monmouthshire County Council and Powys County Council. This means these councils will now join forces to apply for funding from the Government on major projects that will benefit the Marches region. Each council retains their own identity and independence and continue to deliver services to residents and businesses as they do now, but will work together, as partners, where there is mutual benefit and added value.

Areas of cross border shared interests are likely to include transport, skills and housing alongside energy, climate change and digital connectivity – common issues for the area's population of almost 750,000. It is anticipated that the councils' planned collaboration and desire to work together will increase overall investment from the Government, unlocking millions of pounds for identified initiatives that support the Marches' rural economy and green growth.

The councils are looking to sign up to an agreement/memorandum of understanding in October that would confirm functional arrangements between the four councils, there is no cost implication of the partnership, and it does not stop Shropshire from working with other authorities and partners at any point now or in the future. This is the first time neighbouring councils in England and Wales have proposed to work together. Government is enthusiastic about

the planned collaboration which covers a population of nearly ¾ million residents and an area of approximately 1,140,000 hectares.

On a different subject Shropshire Council has reported that it already expects to achieve over £34 million of the £51.4 million spending reductions it identified it needs to find this year. This is more than the combined savings it has delivered in the last three years and represents two thirds of the total it says it needs to find by next April. The council's first quarter financial monitoring report shows that £11m has already been banked, with high confidence that another £23m will be delivered before the end of the financial year. The council has another nine months to confirm how it will deliver the remaining £17m required and expects the majority of this target will be achieved.

While this very significant progress towards the £51.4m target is good news, the report also warns that further, new pressures are emerging. Additional costs are projected from rising demand for adults' and children's services as well as extra costs associated with providing people at risk of becoming homeless with temporary accommodation. These new pressures are currently estimated to add a further £20.5m costs to the council during the current year and it must find new ways to reduce these or reduce demand for its services. The council has longer to address these new demand-led pressures, however. given its improved General Fund 'reserves' position, meaning it has until March 2025 to

In other news, I am very pleased to say that on 29th September Shropshire Council won

the National Council or Local Authority of the Year 2023 at the prestigious National Energy Efficiency Awards. The council beat 16 other local authorities for their efforts in tackling fuel poverty and reducing carbon emissions. Shropshire Council and installation partner BidConnecter were shortlisted for several national awards for the work they do to help make vital home improvements, helping to keep homes warm, lower carbon emissions, and help residents save on energy costs.

BidConnecter, who are the lead insulation company for Shropshire Council's Sustainable Warmth programme, had been shortlisted in four categories at the National Energy Efficiency Awards. This included two categories, National Council or Local Authority of the Year, and National Insulation and Fabric Project of the Year, delivered in partnership with the council. The council and BidConnecter also took silver in the National Insulation and Fabric Project of the Year category. The National Insulation and Fabric Project of the Year award recognises the efforts of all those involved in delivering a successful energy saving project, where new insulation, draft exclusion or energy efficient building materials or systems have been installed as an energy efficiency measure.

AUTUMN COVID VACCINATIONS

The roll out of COVID boosters for care home residents, immunocompromised and at risk people aged 16-64, and for all over-65's began in September. Care home residents and 'at risk' patients will be contacted by their medical practice to arrange vaccination, but all other over-65s will need to make their own appointment to get their jab.

This can be done on-line via the NHS website at www.nhs.uk/nhs-services/covid-19-services/covid-19-vaccination-services/book-covid-19-vaccination/, or through the NHS app. You may need to input your ten digit NHS number if you don't already have this saved in the system. You can find it on any letter the NHS has sent you, on a prescription, or by logging in to your GP practice online service. Don't worry if you are unable to lay your hands on the number – you can still book your vaccination by entering alternative information.

If you don't have on-line access (or just prefer to speak to a real person!) you can dial **119** and make your appointment that way.

Once booked you will be given a booking reference number which you will need to have with you on the day of the vaccination. In Shropshire it appears that the vaccinations will mainly be taking place in local pharmacies – you will be given a choice of location when you book.

SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL BOUNDARY CHANGES

Changes to the local government electoral wards have been decided by the Local Government Boundary Review Commission for England. Our ward of Burnell has some changes- the parish of Cardington is now going to be in the ward of Corvedale, and the parishes of All Stretton, Smethcott and Woolstaston are now going to be in the Bishops Castle Ward. The parishes of Hughley, Kenley and Church Preen will now be part of Burnell (moving from Severn Valley ward). The overall number of voters in the ward will be 3184

The review aimed to make sure that each councillor represents a similar number of electors, and that the boundaries reflected community ties and identities. The new boundaries will come into force in time for the local elections in May 2025.

There will be no changes to the individual Parish Council boundaries, and the total number of Shropshire Council councillors will remain the same at 74.



THE FRIENDS OF THE FOX INN, RYTON

You might think that things have gone quiet with regards to 'The Fox' but behind the scenes we have been very busy in our pursuit of reopening this great pub.

We are a community-based group of local residents. What started as a meeting of concerned individuals has grown into a determined community from the local villages focused on reopening the pub.

This won't just be any pub but a true 'community hub' with great locally produced food and drink but also a café, small shop and meeting space.

So, what has been happening since the last update.....

First and foremost, we have agreed a price to purchase the building with the current owners.

With the help of The Plunkett Foundation, we have submitted an application for a government grant from the Community Ownership Fund. We hope to hear back from the fund just prior to Christmas.

We have set up as a legal entity called a 'Community Benefit Society.' This is a not-for-profit business model which will hopefully smooth the path for third party funders and grants. We have also set up a bank account which was no easy task in itself!

You hopefully will have seen, heard about or even promised to contribute to our pledge campaign with regards to offering shares in the pub. We now have pledges from a large group of residents and businesses from the surrounding villages and even from abroad. We have received assurance from the Seed Enterprise Investment Scheme with regards to claiming tax relief for investors.

We will be opening our share issuance early in the new year when we know the outcome of the grant application. You can still pledge to buy shares via our website on a short form.

Our latest fundraiser is our Christmas Fayre on Sunday 19th November 2023 between 12-4pm. This will be a truly fun family event with Santa's Grotto (£5) stalls, raffle, mince pies and more. The grotto needs to be prebooked with Chrissie via **chrissiefox1@gmail.com**.

Since Rev. Geoff's retirement in July we have continued our usual pattern of services, supported by a number of retired priests and visiting clergy from the Diocese, and we would like to thank them for all they have done and will hopefully continue to do until we manage to fill the vacancy. In September we held our annual service at Langley Chapel, which was well supported, and throughout October we have celebrated Harvest Festival in our churches. It won't be long now until we start thinking about Christmas and the poster gives the date and times of our Christmas and Carol services. You are, of course, welcome to attend any of our services and we look forward to seeing you. At our Carol Service at Acton Burnell, 3pm on Sunday 17th December, we will again be serving mulled wine and mince pies in church after the service.

Recruiting a new Rector

The process for recruiting a new incumbent started with an informal meeting for anyone in the Benefice who wanted to attend on 5th September, where we were told that due to the size of the Parish Share (the amount of money our churches pay the Diocese) we will only be able to appoint a part-time (0.5) Rector, who will live at the Condover Rectory. Members of the PCCs (Parochial Church Councils) for each our churches are in the process of drafting profiles for each Parish. This will be followed by a Community Vacancy Consultation at Condover Church on 11th November after which the Parish profiles (effectively part of the job description for the role) will be agreed with the aim of advertising the vacancy in January, interviewing in March and appointing a new Rector towards the end of July 2024 – this is, of course, if everything goes smoothly and we don't have to re-advertise the post.

SEASONAL RECIPES



FIDGET PIE

First on the list of seasonal delights is Fidget Pie – a Shropshire speciality. There are many theories about the origin of the name: it could be that the pie filling tends to 'fidget around while being cooked, or it could be linked to 'fitched', meaning five-sided. A less pleasant theory is that it smelt like a polecat (or fitchett) while it was cooking, although given the tasty ingredients involved, that seems unlikely!

There are many variations on the Fidget Pie, so apologies if this version differs from the one your Granny or Mum used to make! You can make a vegetarian option by replacing the gammon with either additional vegetables (onion, leeks or butternut squash make good alternatives), or try sliced vegetarian sausages.

Ingredients for the filling: 300g gammon steak 2 Bramley cooking apples

160ml cider 750g Shropshire potatoes 2 onions

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard 50g butter

80g double cream

Ingredients for the pastry:

150g plain flour 150g self-raising flour

150g butter

pinch of salt

(or use ready-made frozen shortcrust pastry).

Pre-heat oven to 190°C, or Gas Mark 5.

Make the pastry by sifting flour and salt into a bowl, adding the butter and rubbing in until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add a little water to help the mixture bind together. Split into two even halves, wrap in clingfilm and pop into the fridge for 20 minutes.

Take half the pastry, roll out and use to line a pie dish. Cover with baking parchment, weighted with baking beans or rice, and bake for 15 minutes. Remove baking parchment and allow to brown for a further 5 minutes.

While the pastry base is cooking, peel and cut up the potatoes and cook in boiling water until tender.

Dice the gammon steak and onions and saute in a pan until sealed and beginning to colour, and then add the cider. Simmer for 15 minutes.

Peel and dice the apples, add to the gammon mixture and stir. Cook for a couple of minutes and then remove from the heat and allow to cool.

Drain the potatoes and mix with the cream, butter and mustard. Add some cheese if you fancy!

Layer the apples into the pie, followed by the potato mix, and then the gammon. Repeat until the pie dish is full.

Roll out the remaining pastry and use to cover the pie. Crimp the edges and cut a hole in the centre for air to escape. Brush with beaten egg and place in the oven for around one hour, or until pastry is golden and crisp.

Enjoy with seasonal veg and a glass of something warming!



BAKED APPLES



Got a glut of apples? Turn them into a delicious quick and easy dessert.

You will need at least one apple per person, depending on their appetite! Score round the circumference of the apple (along the 'equator'), and remove the core using either a corer or a sharp knife. Stand the apples upright in an ovenproof dish.

Ingredients

Mix a handful of dried fruit 2tbsp of light muscovado sugar 1 tsp cinnamon.

You can make this a more indulgent adult treat by soaking the dried fruit overnight in brandy. Use this mixture to fill the core of the apple. Add a walnut sized knob of butter to the top of each apple and sprinkle over 2 tsp of demerara sugar. Bake in the oven at 200degC (or 180°C for a fan oven) until the apples are soft but not at the point of collapse. Delicious with crème fraiche.
