VOTER IDENTIFICATION – DON'T MISS OUT!

It has been reported that around 14,000 people were turned away from May's local elections because they were not able to produce the required photo ID following the recent changes to the law around elections. The Electoral Commission has commented that 'significantly more' people stayed at home and did not even attend a polling station because they believed that they did not have the right ID to hand.

The next local elections in our area will be in 2025, but it is likely that there will be a General Election before that date. If you want to be sure of being able to cast your vote, make sure that you have photo ID available on election day.

Acceptable forms of photo ID are listed as:

- A passport issued by the UK, Isle of Man, British Overseas Territory, EEA state (which includes EU countries plus Norway and Lichtenstein), or a Commonwealth country.
- A driving licence or provisional driving licence issued by the UK, Channel Islands, Isle of Man or an EEA state.
- A Blue Badge.
- Local travel passes such as an older person's bus pass or disabled person's bus pass.
- Some Government issued documents such as biometric immigrations documents, national identity card issued by an EEA state or a Ministry of Defence identity card.

www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id/accepted-forms-photo-id. In every case the original document will need to be shown – not a photocopy or scanned version.

If you don't have any of the above, you can apply for a voter authority certificate from Shropshire Council. Take this along on election date, and you will be able to use it to prove your identity and cast your vote. You will need to complete an application form which must include your name, address, date of birth and National Insurance number, and you will also need to provide a passport style photo.

Voter authority certificate application forms can be found online at the

www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate, or you can visit Shropshire Local hub at the Darwin Shopping Centre, Pride Hill, Shrewsbury (open 9.30am to 5pm Monday to Friday), where you can get help in completing the online application, have the necessary photo taken, and upload any required documents. If you would rather complete a paper application you can have one sent to you by calling 0345 678 9015.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting was held in May with reports presented by the Parish Council and other local bodies; Concord College, Shropshire Council, Godolphin Edwards Charity (a local Parish charity), the Church, Pitchford Village Hall Committee and the Village Views team.

Although this is our annual community meeting and all are welcome unfortunately no members of the public attended to provide comments and feedback.

Matthew Hodge represented Concord College and is the new bursar. He was welcomed and confirmed that the College is committed to continuing its support of the wider local community.

In his Church report Rev. Geoff Garrett confirmed that he is retiring at the end of July. We all wish Geoff well in his retirement and offer our thanks for his service and support to the community over many years. It was also noted that two church wardens had retired from St. Mary's in Acton Burnell and it is suggested that anyone who in interested in taking on this role should contact Jeremy Lowe.

With the new kitchen now installed, the renovations at Pitchford Village Hall are complete and the hall is fully "open for business". Anyone with an event coming up or ideas for clubs, groups or other social gatherings should contact Mike Price, the committee chair.

Shropshire Councillor, Dan Morris noted Shropshire's priorities for strategic planning were:

Healthy People, Healthy Economy, Healthy Environment and Healthy Organisation.

Dan also advised that reductions in central government funding left a £51m budget shortfall which will require significant changes to the size, organisation and operation of Shropshire Council. These will be implemented over the next three years.

The Village Views team confirmed that they can continue to produce a quarterly colour newsletter, financed by the Parish Council, along with an annual Village Directory which is covered by advertising income. The team were thanked for their hard work.

Parish Council Meetings

Annual Parish Council Meeting

The meeting was held in May, immediately following the Parish Meeting. This being the annual statutory meeting, much of the business was devoted to re-election/confirmation of council officers and subcommittee members along with addressing the updating of policies and procedures.

Paul Harrison was re-elected as Chair with Carmen Cullis as Vice Chair.

The 2022/2023 accounts had been completed and successfully audited and reports were approved for submission to the external auditors.

A working group was set up to progress the Frodesley bus shelter replacement and the traffic calming measures (village gateways). Indicative quotations had been obtained.

July Meeting

It was noted that recently a number of road closure signs had not been well placed, giving little help to road users, and had frequently been left in place while no work was in progress or left discarded at the roadside for long periods when work had been completed. Shropshire Highways will be advised and asked to improve the signage of temporary works.

Work on traffic calming (village gateways, signage, etc.) continues along with plans to replace the Frodesley bus shelter.

A number of local footpaths and bridleways have become overgrown. It was noted that landowners are legally obliged to cut back hedges, etc. to keep rights of way clear. Issues can be reported at www.shropshire. gov.uk/forms/countryside-feedback-public-rights-of-way/

The Parish Council gave final approval for the expenses for the Coronation Pub Night in May which was a great success. Thanks again to the Pitchford Village Hall committee and volunteers. It was also agreed to support the 80th D-Day anniversary celebration on June 6th 2024.

The next Parish Council Meeting was set for Tuesday 19 September 2023 at Pitchford Village Hall to start at 19:30.

A new support package will streamline funding support for Shropshire businesses

One of the aims of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) – a fund set up to succeed and improve upon previous EU funding – is to simplify the funding process for businesses looking to access funds. As a result, Shropshire Council has partnered with Birmingham City Council and others to launch the West Midlands small-to-medium sized enterprise (SME) Grants Programme (WMGP).

Existing small-to-medium sized businesses based in the Shropshire Council area can apply for grants from £5,000 to £100,000. Businesses must employ less than 250 people, and have been trading for at least six months. The majority of applications are expected to be for an average grant of between £10,000 and £20,000. Larger grants will be awarded in exceptional circumstances only, to ensure that as many businesses as possible can benefit from the limited budget available, and pplicants must demonstrate their projects will create new jobs. Awards will be considered for the following types of projects:-

- expanding and growing existing businesses
- inward investment
- developing new market opportunities
- innovation, including new product development
- capital investment
- an increase in the productive capacity of new and existing premises through new property builds, refurbishment and extensions.

Enjoy a weekly off-road run through

Grant awards will also be limited to a maximum of 50% of the total project costs, with businesses expected to 'match-fund' whatever grant amount they receive. All potential applicants are therefore urged to refer to the eligibility criteria to make sure they qualify before submitting an application. A new funding round opened on Monday 3 July 2023. Go-ahead for £1.7m schemes aiming to reduce River Severn flooding

Two projects that aim to provide naturebased solutions to reducing flooding on the River Severn are to go ahead after gaining the approval of Shropshire Council's Cabinet in June. The projects are part of a wider programme of testing planned for the upper part of the Severn catchment, to be funded using £4.5 million of Government funding and to be delivered over the next four vears. The two 'demonstrator' schemes are being delivered on behalf of the River Severn Partnership, which is jointly chaired by Shropshire Council and the Environment Agency but encompasses a wide range of government partners, businesses and community-based organisations across the entire Severn and Wye catchment area.

The first £900.000 scheme for Rea Brook in Shrewsbury will be delivered by Severn Rivers Trust and will see the construction

of 200 leaky dams, 4ha of woodland creation, 1.5km planting of new mix hedgerows across slopes, creation of at least 35 water storage features such as ponds, scrapes and swales to provide additional water storage during storms and installation of on-farm rainwater harvesting systems. Benefits will include an estimated 35ha of new wetland habitat to facilitate the development of more natural water management, provide valuable habitat for wading birds and amphibians, improve water quality, reduce the need for fertiliser through soil biodiversity improvements, support farm businesses through water efficiency savings and provide native woodland for a range of priority species and for the sequestration of around 2,500 tonnes of carbon dioxide.

The second £800,000 project for the River Perry looks at peatland restoration and will be led by Shropshire Wildlife Trust in partnership with Harper Adams University. It will involve the rewetting of 11ha of peatland, the creation of 3ha of new native woodland, at least five water storage features and 9ha of paludiculture (commercial crops produced on wetland habitats), alongside two peatland conferences at Harper Adams University to enable engagement and support for the North Shropshire Farmers Group. PROPOSED CHANGES TO LOCAL COUNCIL ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES

A proposed boundary change for local elections suggests that Burnell ward should lose several of its current parishes, and, along with Cound, should be added to Bayston Hill, with two councillors representing the new ward. This is as a result of a Local Government Boundary Commission (LGBC) review of boundaries ahead of the elections in 2025. Draft proposals have been prepared and are available on the Shropshire Council website at: www.lgbce.org.uk/all-reviews/

shropshire

Reviews are carried out periodically as populations change to try to ensure that people are properly represented at local council level, with each councillor essentially representing the same number of voters (within a tolerance of plus or minus 10%). Numbers are adjusted by moving parishes (and voters) from one ward to another.

Following consideration of the proposals at an Extraordinary Meeting in June, the Parish Council submitted the following comments:

In the current review it was determined that Burnell ward is projected to remain within the 10% tolerance for voter numbers (approximately 8% over). Therefore, the Parish Council's first suggestion is that there should be no change to Burnell ward.

However, to address an issue with Bayston Hill, Column and Sutton which are predicted to have 15% over the number of voters for its 2 councillor ward the LGBC are proposing to:

- Take All Stretton/Smethcott/Woolstaton PC and Pulverbatch PC from Burnell and add them to Bishops Castle.
- Take Cardington PC from Burnell and add it to Corvedale.
- Add the remaining voters from Burnell and also Cound Parish to the 2 Bayston Hill Parishes thereby creating a new 2 member ward of Burnell and Bayston Hill.

This proposal seems to be unreasonable as:

- Burnell and Bayston Hill are very different in character with Burnell consisting of small, fairly isolated rural parishes and Bayston Hill essentially an outer suburb of Shrewsbury. Residents have very different needs and concerns and combining them will risk the rural population not being properly served.
- The new ward will comprise almost 60% Bayston Hill residents giving concerns that this may well lead to the specific needs of the remainder of the current Burnell ward and Cound taking second place and

- being overlooked. It should also be noted that the Burnell section would cover approximately 80% of the geographical area of the new ward.
- The remainder of Burnell ward could find itself represented by two Councillors who live in Bayston Hill and may not be focussed on or understand the needs of the residents of Burnell ward. (It should be noted that the remainder of Burnell plus Cound will have sufficient voters to be within the-10% margin, seemingly continuing to justify separate representation)
- Current Boundary Commission proposals will place Burnell and Bayston Hill in different parliamentary constituencies which will lead to additional confusion regarding representation. Note also that these parliamentary boundaries have only recently been reviewed and further changes would only lead to more confusion.
- The two areas also fall under different dioceses (Hereford and Litchfield)

As the LGBC do not seem particularly fixed on this approach and has specifically requested alternatives to be put forward (note that in a review of the 62 published residents contributions, we were unable to find any specific support for combining Burnell and Bayston Hill), the Parish Council would strongly prefer no changes be made to the existing Burnell Ward, as it is projected to continue to meet the required tolerance.

The issue with Bayston Hill would seem to be better resolved by combining with Oteley and Reabrook creating a 2-member suburban ward.

The Parish Council feels strongly that the LGBC should be urged to revise their recommendations so as to maintain the overall shared rural nature of Burnell ward, possibly opting for the above alternative to resolving the Bayston Hill issue rather than the current proposal.

At the July Parish Council meeting, Shropshire Councillor Dan Morris advised that Shropshire Council had also objected to the proposed local government boundary changes with regard to combining Bayston Hill and Burnell parishes. A solution making Bayston Hill a special case has been proposed.

Final recommendations are due to be published in October with parliamentary approval set for November. New arrangements will apply for the 2025 local elections.

I also wish to thank my brilliant practice team who have supported me and made the day job so enjoyable, despite the roller coaster ride that is the NHS.'

Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin Healthier Together

A new website has been launched to provide consistent, accurate and trustworthy healthcare advice to parents, carers of children, young people and professionals.

Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin Healthier Together is a free website developed by healthcare professionals to help parents and carers keep their children safe and healthy. The website provides clear advice and information for anyone in Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin who wants a reliable source of local information and is available by visiting

www.stw-healthiertogether.nhs.uk.

The website will be a boost for children and their families, and will help to ensure the right people are being directed to the right services. The easy-to-use self-triage tool gives health advice via a system of red, amber, and green signs which directs the user to the right place for the care of the child. If the website suggests the child does not need professional medical care, it may still suggest self-care for minor

ailments (green), that can be provided at home or via their local pharmacy with over-the-counter treatments. For children rated as amber, parents will be directed to primary care services, or NHS111 if outside normal GP practice opening hours. In cases where urgent or emergency treatment could be required (red), the website will signpost the parent or carer to a nearby Accident and Emergency Department.

With typical waiting times for health services at a record high, the hope is that this new website will provide parents with an alternative way of helping to identify the support they need in a quick and easy way.

Carer Connect Group

April saw the successful launch of 'Carer Connect' - a community initiative to support the carers of Much Wenlock & Cressage Medical Practice. Community & Care Co-ordinator Jo Weaver-Jackson identified the need for the group as so many volunteers and other local initiatives were lost through covid, leaving carers feeling isolated within
