#### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

The council met in mid-March. Papers and draft minutes are available at www.actonburnellparishcouncil.org.uk.

It was rather disappointing to note that there had been no response to the council's suggestion in the last Village Views and on Facebook of funding an annual community event, possibly along the lines of the Jubilee Picnic, and rotating around the four villages which comprise the combined parishes; Acton Burnell, Pitchford, Frodesley and Ruckley & Langley. Clearly without community support it will not be possible to pursue this proposal.

A site meeting covering all four villages had been held with the local Traffic Engineer. A number of traffic calming measures had been discussed. Following the advice received. it was agreed to apply for a statutory 30mph speed limit for Frodesley village and roads approaching the Frodesley crossroads and for improved signing at the crossroads. Additionally, 30mph painted roadway roundels have been requested for the other villages. These will be applied at each 30mph sign and repeater. Village gateways were also discussed as it would seem that there is space to install these on the nearside of the approaches to each village. These would be funded by the council and it was agreed to prepare proposals and costings for discussion.

An initial quotation for replacement of the Frodesley bus shelter was received. Comparative quotes will be obtained.

Following requests from residents, it was agreed to arrange a short instruction session covering use of the defibrillator units and basic CPR, repeating the session held when the units were first installed. This will be at Pitchford Village Hall, date to be advised.

## THE FOX INN AT RYTON

#### An update from Dan Morris – Shropshire Councillor for the ward of Burnell

Hello, this time I'd like to talk about the 'Friends of the Fox' (The Fox Inn at Ryton) and how the community there is coming together to try and restart the pub by buying it!

Everyone I'm sure is aware that pubs have had a hard time in the past few years, in particular of late with Covid and massively rising energy costs. Sadly last year The Fox succumbed and closed its doors. The Fox at Ryton, along many other pubs in the county, has been the focal point of its community for decades, even centuries! I remember drinking there from my late teenage years, along with many other local rural pubs. So to see it closed was a big loss for the both community of Ryton and the wider Shropshire Community who appreciate a drink and good locally sourced food.

The village of Ryton, and the wider community, has swung into action - working with the co-operation of the current owners, and the helpful support of Condover Parish Council, the pub has been listed as a 'community asset' and a legal process has been triggered which means the group are the sole bidders for a six month period. The Friends of the Fox are a group headed by David Oliver, the former

Head Teacher of Church Stretton School and a strong steering group has been set up to support him.

After receiving advice/pointers from Shropshire Council and other agencies that facilitate grants, the Friends of the Fox are now actively applying for grants from various funders. They have also applied to become a 'Community Benefit Society.' Seventy-eight per cent of community pubs have been secured using a Community Benefit Society, as it is explicitly an organisation for the benefit of the community. Amongst the advantages of a Community Benefit Society are that it has a voluntary and open membership, democratic member control (one vote per member), it tends to secure a large number of people who have a financial interest in the success, and it has a statutory asset lock (ie assets must be retained and distributed for the benefit of the society). The group are very keen for this to be seen as an opportunity for the wider community to become involved in the initiative and for as many as possible to feel part of this project to reopen The Fox.

The friends of the Fox have throughout the process sought the advice of The Plunkett

Society, a charity which specialises in in assisting rural communities wanting to run community owned businesses. At the time of writing the group have two confirmed fundraising events in April with more fun events to follow from May such as a car treasure hunt and a Young Farmers event. A bank account has been set up, and in April the valuation process will be taking place. A share offering is proposed which would be available to any adult to purchase for £250 per share. It is hoped that shares would be bought by a broad breadth of residents, not just in Ryton but also in the many surrounding villages.

#### LOCAL GARDENS OPENING THEIR GATES TO VISITORS

What could be nicer on a warm spring, summer or autumn day than a stroll through a beautiful garden, perhaps with the chance of tea, coffee and a slice of home-made cake on offer?

In 2022, despite a prolonged drought which led to many gardens closing, the National Garden Scheme raised £3.11 million for its designated charities. The lion's share (£2.45 million in 2022) goes to nursing and health charities, including Marie Curie, Macmillan and Hospice UK. Smaller donations are made to a number of charities which provide access to gardens and gardening for people suffering health and disability challenges, and to organisations which help support gardens and gardeners in the UK.

Listed below are a number of local gardens which will be opening this year. All the gardens shown offer free entry to children. Tickets can be bought at the gates on the day (but please be aware that many gardens can only accept cash) or booked in advance through the National Garden Scheme website (www.ngs.org.uk), where you will also find details of open gardens throughout the country.

#### Longner Hall, Atcham, SY4 4TG

(Sunday 7th May). Enjoy walks lined with yew offering views over the Severn Valley. Rose and herbaceous borders and an ancient yew wood. Visitors are also invited to view the walled garden. Home-made teas in aid of St Eatas Church, Atcham. Open from 2pm to 5pm. Tickets £6.

Henley Hall, Henley, Ludlow, SY8 3HD (Sunday 7th May). A mixture of formal and informal gardens, including walks along the

#### The Bramleys, Condover, SY5 7BH

(Sunday 25th June). A two acre garden with a variety of trees, shrubs, herbaceous borders and woodland, with the Cound Brook winding its way through. Gates open from 11am to 5pm, with home-made teas available throughout the day. Tickets are £6, which also includes entrance to 1 Grange Court on the same day.

#### Edge Villa, Edge, nr Yockleton, SY5 9PY

We know it was put up in its present location in 1926, but the building was much older and was taken down from another location and repositioned in Pitchford. or so. ## **ACTON BURNELL CONSERVATION AREA**

While all the villages which make up the Burnell ward have their own charm and wealth of beautiful buildings, you may not be aware that one of them, Acton Burnell, is also a conservation area.

Conservation areas are designated by the local council due to their special architectural or historic interest, and serve to help preserve and protect the character and appearance of a village or neighbourhood. Acton Burnell is one of 127 conservation areas in Shropshire, along with near neighbours Cardington and Condover.

In Acton Burnell, the conservation area extends from Denver House in the west to parts of Concord College grounds in the east, and from the haulage yard and sewage works in the north (including Stoneleigh Close) to Castle Barns and Home Farm in the south.


Living in a conservation area obviously brings with it the pleasure and privilege of living in an attractive setting, but also carries a number of restrictions, designed to make sure that the local character is maintained. These aren't as strict as for Listed Buildings, but there are a few things you may need to watch out for.

Shropshire Council has extra controls over conservation areas when it comes to planning permission, and it is an offence to demolish or alter a building or structure in a conservation area without the Council's consent. You may not be aware, but this can apply even to the removal of a wall or fence! In general, the strictest rules apply to what can be seen from the street, and things are a little more relaxed when it comes to the back of the house.

Shropshire Council is particularly concerned to protect trees in conservation areas — and we do have some lovely old trees in Acton Burnell! Permission should be sought before cutting down, uprooting, topping or lopping a tree, and this applies to all trees over a certain size, not just those that are subject to a Preservation Order. If your tree has a trunk which is over 75mm diameter at a point 1.5m above the ground, then you need to apply to the Council at least six weeks before any work is due to take place.

You can find the necessary form to do this at www.shropshire.gov.uk/media/20291/application-for-trees-to-be-pruned-or-felled-2021.pdf. You need to be very specific about what you plan to do, so a photo or two of the tree in question, and a plan of the site may be helpful.

#### **FIX MY STREET**

Spotted something in the neighbourhood that's broken or damaged? Want to make sure it gets sorted? You can report pot holes, blocked road drains, fly tipping, graffiti or broken paving slabs to the local council quickly and easily by going online at www.fixmystreet.com.

Simply enter the postcode or street name and town or village where the problem is located, and the website shows you a map of the area (you can zoom in and out on the map, or move the area shown if you aren't able to pinpoint the spot straight away). A click identifies the place where the problem is and you can then choose from a list of possible problems.

You can add more detail and a brief description if necessary, and the report is then sent to the appropriate council on your behalf.

## COMING SOON AT **PITCHFORD HALL**

The focus for this year at Pitchford Hall is the Marches of Time History Weekend, which will also be running at Stokesay Court on 16th and 17th September. Talks, demonstrations and re-enactments will be on offer on both days. James Nason of Pitchford Hall said, "We're very keen for the weekend to be well supported by Shropshire and the local community. If there's interest in the weekend we'll seek to run it each year and build on it. We have such incredible history in the Parish in terms of Roman, Medieval, Tudor, Civil War, etc and we're keen to celebrate it."

James also commented, "I would be very grateful if you would thank all our wonderful volunteers. We simply would not be able to provide the current level of public access to the Hall without them. We are extremely fortunate to have such brilliant volunteers within our local community."

Visitors to the Hall will have noticed some recent additions to the formal rooms, including a beautiful and striking blue Millichope table and chairs made from Noble Fir, created from a tree which was damaged in a storm, and which now graces the library. The library itself has been filled by donations of books to replace those which were lost in the 1990s.

In the grounds of the Hall the orchard by the Orangery is home to a number of apple trees. Pitchford Hall is a member of the Marcher Apple Network, which aims to revive and preserve traditional apple varieties.

And to add a touch of glamour to the grounds, peacocks have recently been successfully re-introduced. There were peacocks in residence since the early 20th century, but these sadly died out after the Colthurst family sold Pitchford Hall in 1992. ## CONCORD STUDENTS' EXPEDITION TO SUPPORT STREET CHILDREN IN RURAL KENYA

This summer, 24 students from Concord College are travelling to Kenya for an expedition combining volunteering, medical work experience and trekking. The group will work closely with the Moving Mountains Trust charity which supports schools, rural communities and street children in the town of Embu, north of Nairobi. The college Medical Society previously went out to Kenya in 2019 and are looking forward to working with the charity again after the pandemic.

The team is aiming to raise £10,000 to fund projects to support the Embu Rescue Centre where around 120 street children from the most difficult backgrounds can get a daily lunch and breakfast and receive help from caring adult staff and volunteers.

Many of these families struggle to provide meals for their children so the rescue centre plays a vital role. Many live in nearby slums with no running water or sanitation. The children face many issues including poverty, pressure to engage in gang membership and substance abuse. The centre opens every day and also provides showers and toilets and space to relax.

The team are aiming to raise £10,000 to support the work of the Moving Mountains Trust and would welcome any donations which can be made via JustGiving: Concord College Outreach is fundraising for Moving Mountains (justgiving.com)

After their volunteering work the team hope to climb Mount Kenya, the 2nd highest mountain in Africa. At just under 5000m the challenging trek takes 5 days.

To get fit they will each try to climb 5000m in the gym on steppers or in the local hills.

## **CHURCH NEWS**

The main news from the churches in Acton Burnell, Condover, Frodesley and Pitchford is that Rev Geoff Garrett is retiring on 31st July. His last service is on 23rd July 10am at Condover Church. Following his retirement the ongoing church services and activities will continue with the help of the current Lay Readers Jeremy Lowe and Ray Evanson, ably assisted by experienced retired clergy from around the Condover Deanery as well as the Churchwardens and Parochial Church Councils of the Benefice. After July the recruitment process will begin for the next Rector of the Benefice.

## THE GODOLPHIN EDWARDS CHARITY

Over the last few months the charity trustees have been reviewing the range of the trust and the grants it is giving and how we might widen the objects of the trust so that we can benefit a wider group of people. After consulting with the Hereford Diocese legal department we were put in touch with the Staffordshire Community Foundation (a group which, despite its name, includes Shropshire charities) who manage a large number of charities in order to take the pressure and ultimate trustee responsibility and legal obligations from them and take it on themselves. The agreement still allows for local involvement as consulting trustees and some of the current trustees will continue as such. This means that when an application for help from the trust is received, the Foundation will consult with the local trustees who have the necessary local knowledge. This has also come about because two of the trustees are standing down and joining the Community Foundation secures the long term management of the Trust in the future.

Once the transfer is finally complete in the near future, applications will have to be made through the foundation and when that time comes full details of how to apply will be made clear. In the meantime applications can still be made by letter detailing the need to Rev Geoff Garrett, The Rectory, Condover, Shrewsbury SY5 7AA.

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
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
