### LIGHTSOURCE GRANTS FOR LOCAL GROUPS

Every year the Parish Council receives a payment from Lightsource Renewable Energy Ltd. as part of the agreement set up when two solar farms were established in the community. The payment is set aside in a separate account to provide funding for community developments and for clubs, groups and organisations based in the Parish.

The Lightsource Fund is administered by the Parish Council. Applications for grants are reviewed and decided at the regular Parish Council meetings.

Local clubs and organisations are welcome to apply for funding to develop and achieve their aims and objectives, which must be of direct benefit to the community represented by the Parish Council. All organisations and clubs must be able to demonstrate that they comply with all prevailing legislation. Grants aren't available to individuals or to national charities, and will not generally be available where funding is already being received from another funding body.

## ANNIVERSARY OF THE D-DAY LANDINGS



This year marks the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings during World War II. Events have been planned across the UK to remember the day, which saw the largest air, sea and land operation in history, involving hundreds of thousands of servicemen and women.

Across the country, the date will be marked by lighting beacons in local communities at 9.15pm, creating a network of light throughout the UK. A beacon will be lit on Acton Burnell hill, courtesy of the Acton Burnell Estate, and everyone is welcome to attend.

The day has also been declared 'National Fish and Chip Day'. Fish and chips have long been seen as the British national dish, and during both World Wars the British Government safeguarded the supply of fish and potatoes to ensure that fish and chips remained available to the population. Fish and chips were among the few foods not to be subject to rationing during both world wars.

### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

### CONCORD COLLEGE EXPANSION

Following a site visit, Shropshire Council Southern Planning Committee met on April 16th to consider the plans for the new hall of residence. Councillor Harrison reiterated and stressed previous concerns raised regarding the siting of the new block. However, the Committee voted unanimously to accept the plans.

### **OTHER NEWS**

The Council met on March 5th. Papers and draft minutes are available at www.actonburnellparishcouncil.org. uk/meetings

The main items discussed along with developments since the meeting are as follows.

• Acton Burnell Castle remains closed awaiting work on a number of trees which have been found to be unsafe. The Council has been in contact with English Heritage since the closure and continues to press for the work to be completed as soon as possible. It is understood that a meeting between EH and the owner of the small copse at the castle entrance, where one of the trees is located, is planned for late April. Hopefully a solution will be agreed at that time and quickly implemented. An interim option of opening an entrance via the Catholic churchyard is also being considered.

- The Council approved a contractor for the village gateways which will be installed later this year for Acton Burnell, Pitchford, Frodesley and Ruckley. Shropshire Council are being pressed to progress the new 30mph speed limit, mirror, etc. for Frodesley which should have been in place in the first quarter of 2024.
- Potholes and eroded verges continue to be a problem. Everyone is urged to report these issues via the 'Fix my Street' website **www.fixmystreet.com**.
- The lower courses of stonework on the bus shelter at Pitchford are badly eroded and quotes are begin sought

to rebuild the low walls, replacing the damaged stone.

- An objection has been raised to the Shropshire Council order declaring the track from Pitchford to Golding to be a bridleway. This will be considered by the Council and may be passed to the Planning Inspectorate for determination by an Independent Inspector.
- Parish noticeboards have been refurbished but the Ruckley board is beyond repair and is to be replaced.
- It was agreed to hold the Annual Parish (Community) meeting as a standalone event this year and the meeting is scheduled for Thursday 16th May. Refreshments will be provided and all residents are welcome to attend. We are hoping for a good turnout and some useful comments and ideas.

The Annual Parish Council Meeting was set for Tuesday 14th May 2024 at Pitchford Village Hall to start at 19:30.

### INCREASE IN PRESCRIPTION CHARGES

From 1st May, charges for prescriptions and prescription prepayment certificates will increase by 2.59%, bringing the cost of a prescription to £9.90. If you have more than 2 prescription items each month, you may want to consider obtaining a prescription pre-payment certificate. ### **KEEP MY PLACE IN QUEUE**

A new service called 'Keep My Place in Queue' is now available when calling the surgery at busy times. Callers will be able to choose to either hang on the line and wait to be answered, or opt to be called back. The system will call you back as soon as a receptionist is available, and connect you when you answer. Please note this system will not work if you choose to withhold your number. Make sure you stay by the phone you used to call the surgery, as the system will only call you back once, and if you are not available you will have to start the process again.

### THINK! PHARMACY FIRST

NHS England has launched a new Pharmacy First Service.

This new service is expected to free up GP appointments for patients who need them most and will give people quicker and more convenient access to safe and high quality healthcare. It includes 7

common conditions including earache, sore throat, and urinary tract infections, aiming to address health issues before they get worse.

### What can the pharmacy deal with?

Pharmacy First will enable community pharmacists to supply prescriptiononly medicines, including antibiotics and antivirals where clinically appropriate, to treat seven common health conditions without the need to visit a GP.

### What are the seven common conditions?

Sinusitis, sore throat, earache, infected insect bites, impetigo (a bacterial skin infection), shingles and uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women.

### How can I access treatment from my pharmacy?

Shropshire Council have confirmed that all community pharmacies in across Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin have signed up to Pharmacy First and patients can use the Find a Pharmacy tool online, just walk in and ask to speak to a pharmacist or call 111 to be given details of local pharmacies participating.

### MESSAGE FROM COUNCILLOR DAN MORRIS SHROPSHIRE COUNCILLOR FOR BURNELL

At the end of February Shropshire Council voted to set a balanced budget for 2024/25, laying out plans to close a funding gap of £62m arising from increased demand and rising costs for its services, especially in social care and housing.

As a backdrop in 2023/24 the council made the highest amount of savings ever made, over £40m in one financial year. This was achieved this by investing in prevention to manage demand for our services, and using new, innovative ways to meet demand using the resources the council has. The Council would be in a much more difficult position without these changes.

The budget plans for 2024/5 included increasing income, reducing the amount the council spends with third parties, managing demand for its services, and reducing the size of the council overall. As the council has already stated, it expects to reduce its size by around 300 full time equivalent posts. Setting a balanced budget is a legal requirement for any council and Shropshire's plans are to prioritise services that support the most vulnerable people in the county. The budget also includes a 4.99% increase in council tax, which the Government assumes councils will make, and includes a 2% adult social care precept. For the average band D property in Shropshire, this will mean an extra £1.57 a week for Shropshire Council's part of council tax bills. 95% of all councils with a responsibility for social care are, like Shropshire, raising their bills by this amount.

Funding pressures are affecting councils all over the country, and these are made even more challenging by Shropshire's rural geography and older population. The council's savings for 2024/25 are equivalent to 10% of its overall budget, to deliver day-to-day services. Services across the council will be reviewed: some will change, some will reduce and some will stop altogether. Significant changes will go through consultation, and the public will be able to share their views and alternative suggestions.

Included in the savings plans are:

- Reviewing the strategy for library provision to make savings
- Reducing support for leisure provision
- Reducing the number of Household Recycling Centres
- An optional, charged, household green waste collection service

- Reducing the number of council buildings and other assets, and accelerating the move from Shirehall, Shrewsbury into alternative offices
- Changing how we meet the transport needs of children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities: a consultation is ongoing.
- Following agreement of the budget plans, the council will now progress the next steps to ensure that the plans can be put into action as quickly as possible.

For a number of proposals, such as for libraries and leisure centres, the council will now start discussions with local partners and communities to see how they could continue outside of council control, to explore ways to help reduce the impact for local people as far as possible. The council will also start planning public consultations on significant services changes as a result of the budget.

# **GODOLPHIN EDWARDS FUND**

This local fund was set up with the aim of providing grants to individuals living in Acton Burnell, Frodesley, Pitchford and Langley & Ruckley. Now administered by The Community Foundation, the fund is available to provide grants of up to £500.

Grants are available for people who need assistance in one of four areas: educational; financial; social; medical and health. Grants may be awarded for things like transport to get to a social club or group or to a hospital or medical appointment, assistance with paying for an unexpected bill or essential purchase or help to buy necessary books or technology for a college or university course.

There are two funding rounds each year, but applications can be made at any time. The current funding round opened in April, with decisions to be made in May, and the second funding round will open in October, with awards made in November.

### HAVE YOUR SAY ON GREEN WASTE COLLECTION PLANS

Shropshire Council is asking householders for their views on proposals to introduce an annual charge for the collection of green waste. The consultation asks people if they would be willing to pay more than £52 a year if the additional money was used to keep all five Shropshire Household Recycling Centres open, and for views on whether the opening times of some recycling centres could be reduced.

Also up for discussion is the idea of introducing a new permit/booking system for people visiting a recycling centre, to help ensure that they are only used by people living in Shropshire.

Charging for garden waste collections, and closing two of the council's five recycling centres, are among proposals approved by councillors as part of Shropshire Council's budget cuts for 2024/2025. The Council has announced that they must find  $\pm 62m$  of savings in the current financial year in order to balance the budget.

# ●●●● SEASONAL RECIPES ●●●

Despite the generally miserable and wet weather in April, we are now very much heading into summer, and what says summer more than strawberries! If you don't fancy eating them in the traditional way – with sugar and cream with your feet up watching Wimbledon on the telly – then have a go at the recipe below.



#### WHITE CHOCOLATE AND BASIL CREAM WITH BALSAMIC STRAWBERRIES

This is a showstopper that looks and tastes amazing, but is actually quite simple to pull off! If you don't fancy making the complete dessert, then the balsamic strawberries on their own are delicious with some vanilla ice cream.

### Ingredients (to serve 4)

300ml pot of single cream

- 1 large bunch of basil
- 300g white chocolate, chopped
- 50g caster sugar
- 2 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 250g strawberries, hulled and cut in half

Pour the cream into a saucepan. Roughly tear the basil leaves into large pieces. Bring to a simmer and then remove from the heat and leave to sit for 5 minutes. Use a slotted spoon to remove the basil. Bring the cream back up to a gentle simmer, remove from the heat and mix in the chocolate, stirring until melted and smooth. Pour into serving glasses and chill in the fridge until firm (this will take at least an hour).

In the meantime, mix the caster sugar and balsamic vinegar with 2tbsp water and cook gently, stirring until the sugar is dissolved and the mixture forms a sticky syrup. Add the strawberries and stir gently. Remove from the heat and allow to cool.

Finally, add the balsamic strawberries to the chilled chocolate and cream mix and serve!

### SHROPSHIRE BLUE AND VEGETABLE FRITTATA

Sadly, the origins of Shropshire Blue cheese had absolutely nothing to do with Shropshire! It is a relatively modern cheese, which began life in Scotland and more recently has been made in Nottinghamshire. The reason for calling it 'Shropshire' Blue is a mystery. However, if you do want to try a local version, you may be able to track down Wrekin or Ludlow Blue at specialist cheese shops, farmshops and delicatessens. Whatever blue cheese you choose this is a quick and tasty lunch or dinner option.



### Ingredients (to serve 4)

2 tbsp cooking oil (rapeseed or olive oil are good for this)

120g blue cheese, finely crumbled or grated

#### 6 eggs

1 small onion, sliced (or substitute a good handful of chopped spring onions)

1 red pepper, chopped

100g mushrooms, sliced

150g new potatoes, boiled and cubed

Around 50g selection of cooked seasonal vegetables (leftovers are fine!)

Handful of parsley (or other fresh herbs to taste)

You will need a large ovenproof frying pan or skillet, around 25cm in diameter. Preheat your grill while you start cooking.

Heat the oil in the frying pan on the hob. Cook the onions, mushrooms and pepper until soft, then add the potatoes and any other pre-cooked vegetables you are using – carrots, leeks and peas all work well.

Beat the eggs along with around 90g of the cheese and the herbs. Pour into the pan containing the vegetables and cook on a medium heat for 3 to 4 minutes.

Sprinkle over the remaining cheese, and pop into the oven for 4 to 5 minutes, or until set.

Slide onto a serving dish or board and serve warm cut into generous wedges. Great with a beetroot salad or coleslaw.

## VILLAGE HALL SUSTAINABILITY EVENT

They sold out! There was also a pop-up farm shop selling home-made goodies, locally sourced produce and a highland beef stall-just in time for Easter feasts.

The event also supported fellow charity, The Shrewsbury Food Hub, which collects and distributes good quality food from supermarkets to communities and into bellies- not bins!. The guys at Shrewsbury Food Hub ran a food share table, swapping the food they had 'harvested' for donations. For shoppers, there was a good collection of stalls selling a wide range of crafts and gifts from alpaca socks to willow baskets, damson vodka to fresh cut Flowers, vintage clothes to all natural hand cream and even bags made from unwanted event banners and other recycled materials. The vendors did a great job of providing visitors with a wide array of beautiful and innovative sustainable products.

To encourage folks to consider getting green fingered by growing their own, there was a plant stall focussed on veg and herb starter kits. Youngsters were encouraged to get their hands dirty and plant their own sunflowers to brighten up gardens and attract bees and birds later in the year.

To celebrate our fabulous natural surroundings and remind ourselves why looking after the planet is so important Jeremy Lowe led a circular walk (despite the blustery showers) of about 5km via Stockbatch Farm. Fifteen folks and several furry friends enjoyed the walk and returned covered in mud for a well-earned breakfast butty and a hot cuppa!

The event had a lovely community vibe, with volunteers working hard in the kitchen, wrestling with the gazebo, in the car park and cleaning up afterwards. The Hall was decorated with beautiful hand-made bunting made from spare fabric and donated for free from a friend of the hall!. The Committee chairman Mike Price, parked up some of his vintage tractors to promote the 're-pair, re-love, reuse' theme. It was also supported by our local councillor Dan Morris and representatives from the Parish council.

The money raised from the butties and plant stall has gone into the PVH pot to help maintain the Hall and keep it up and running as your much-loved community space. PVH would like to thank everyone who helped out, came along, and supported PVH!
