PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The council met in September. Papers and draft minutes are available at www.actonburnellparishcouncil.org.uk/meetings/parish-council-meeting-31

Following changes to the requirements and guidelines, Councillors attended Code of Conduct refresher training session, also in September.

Our clerk, Anna Morris, is taking maternity leave (congratulations on the arrival of baby Joss!) and we are pleased to welcome Sharon Clayton as our locum clerk. We have the Jubilee tree planting to look forward to and, with a suitable site found so far only in Acton Burnell, those with land in the other parishes are again requested to consider setting aside patches of land, preferably adjacent to existing footpaths, where trees could be planted. Please contact the clerk.

Older model defibrillators at Pitchford, Ruckley and Frodesley have now been replaced together with updated cabinets at all three locations and the cabinet at Acton Burnell.

On the highways front progress with Shropshire Council regarding traffic calming, particularly for Frodesley, where a mirror is being sought, is very slow but is being pursued by the Parish Council and by our Shropshire Councillor. Additional issues which have been raised are:

- The need for appropriate signage and road marking at the King Street crossroads in Berrington.
- Installation of road markings/white lining and perhaps signage on the bend at the Royal Oak in Pitchford.
- Improvements to the visibility of the sign at the turning for Acton Burnell off the A458 on the approach from Shrewsbury at Weeping Cross. The turning cannot be seen at night and the sign is currently obscured by tree branches.

The new on-line reporting system for highways issues (potholes, signage, etc.) which is available at **www.fixmystreet.com** seems to be working well.

More widely, Shropshire Council has issued a Winter Wellness Guide for carers which can be found at: https://shropshire.gov.uk/media/24506/winter-wellness-guide-for-carers-2022.pdf Although aimed at carers as the title suggests, the document provides much useful information for everyone as we head into winter along with links and contact information regarding Covid vaccinations, cost of living issues, self-care, etc.

LOCAL ROAD CLOSURES

From Monday 3rd November to Friday 9th November the road at Harley Bank will be closed overnight for carriageway repairs. It is planned for the road to be closed from 8.00pm to 6.00am.

On 6th December the road will be closed for one day only at the Hughley junction on the B4371 at Presthope. This is to enable tree pruning to take place.




COURSES FOR TEENAGERS

MESSAGE FROM COUNCILLOR DAN MORRIS SHROPSHIRE COUNCILLOR FOR BURNELL

A couple of topics that highlight the pressures on the finances of Shropshire Council (SC).

Inflation and rising demand's new pressures on council's budget

Inflation and rising energy costs, alongside growing demand for council services – particularly for children's social care and safeguarding – are the main reasons for a predicted overspend of at least £4.1m at SC this year. Each quarter SC examines its budget against spending, and in the 1st quarter it highlights that inflation is adding an extra £5 million to the costs of running services while extra demand for council services, which is also predicted to increase further as more people face cost of living pressures, is adding almost another £7 million.

SC is no longer receiving any money from Government to offset the impacts of COVID in spite of the fact that some services are still experiencing knock-on effects from the pandemic such as more demand for social care, reinforced by extra pressures on the NHS. This, coupled with growing costs in children's social care in particular, is forcing the predicted overspend this year up between its best case scenario of £4.1m and worst case of £18.8 million. Just as households face very big increases in costs, SC is also facing a really tough year with rising fuel and contract costs.

The SC council leadership will be focusing its efforts to significantly reduce any overspend. A sign of the growing pressure on services, which remain affected by the impact of the pandemic, is that the number of children in care in April 2022 was 53% higher than in April 2020 and is up 21% year on year. Such placements, that help ensure children are kept safe, can be hugely expensive for councils.

It is likely that the council will need to sell off more capital assets. This will include reducing its number of offices, such as its Mount McKinley offices on Shrewsbury Business Park by next April [2023]. This is just one of several measures the council will be bringing forward to help offset the pressures from inflation and greater demand for services.

Update on the discussions which continue on the future operation of Acton Scott Historic Working Farm

The future of Acton Scott Historic Working Farm is still currently being discussed by the estate's owners and SC, which has operated the visitor attraction under a lease agreement for the past 40 years. The review is wide-ranging as both parties wish to be thorough in their evaluation to achieve a positive and fair outcome for Acton Scott Historic Working Farm.

The working farm museum was the vision of Thomas Acton who established a museum demonstrating farming techniques at the turn of the century before the advent of the internal combustion engine. Visitor numbers peaked at around 45,000 in 2009 with the advent of the BBC's 'Victorian Farm' television show and have now fallen to 20,000 visitors per annum. There is a current operating deficit of £168,000 per annum, the Shropshire taxpayer has been subsidising the running costs of the farm at a cost of £8.40 per visitor. SC is aware that people place a lot of value on Acton Scott Historic Working Farm and it is recognised that it has its importance socially, educationally and in terms of the visitor economy. SC wants to reach a workable solution with the estate and explore all possible options in doing so. But SC, as alluded to above, is facing many additional pressures on its budgets. Regrettably the operation is no longer considered

PRACTICE NEWS FROM MUCH WENLOCK AND CRESSAGE MEDICAL PRACTICE

COVID and Flu Vaccines

This year we will be providing Flu and COVID vaccines in clinics based in William Brookes School. The vaccines will be delivered together as advised by the JCVI. For anyone wishing to have the vaccinations separately, this will be provided towards the end of the campaign in designated clinics. We will be using the Moderna Bivalent vaccine for all those aged 18 years or over, which has action against the Omicron COVID variant. The only exceptions will be those under 18 years of age who will require a Paediatric Dose of Pfizer, and those with true vaccine allergies, who will need referring to a designated clinic in Secondary Care. By the time of reading this some of you may have been contacted by us to book your vaccine, or even had them done. Our vaccine clinic timings are limited by the delivery dates of our vaccines which are beyond our control. We are however endeavouring to hold clinics as soon as possible after each delivery.

For any patients who are unable to leave their house we will be doing housebound vaccines. Our reception team will be contacting those patients who are known to be housebound, however if you are concerned we may not be aware of your circumstances please speak with our reception team. We are lucky to have a very community minded patient population, so if any of you aren't sure if a neighbour or friend needs help to get their vaccine, please ask them and help them out.

Shingles and Pneumonia Vaccines

Previously we have given these at the same time as Flu, however the Pneumonia and Shingles vaccines will now be given in dedicated clinics in the surgery which are being organised by our nursing team. If you are due one of these and not heard from us, then please contact the surgery and our reception team will be able to help.

Communications

We are aware that you are keen to know about these clinics and are going to do our upmost to communicate this across as many platforms as possible, but the best way to ensure you hear from us is to check we have the correct phone numbers and email for you. We will do our best to get information to you as soon as possible and as always appreciate your patience and understanding.

First Contact Practitioner appointments available now

Patients can now access a First Contact Practitioner through the Practice. The First Point Practitioner is an trained Physiotherapist who can assess your condition, advise any short-term treatments, suggest things that may help and, if appropriate, refer you to our local Physiotherapy or Musculoskeletal Clinic if you need a course of treatment. This assessment will be over the telephone or video link. If you were thinking of calling to speak to a GP for the first time about a back or joint problem or something similar, this may be good alternative. Please contact our reception team if you would like to book your appointment with the First Contact Practitioner.

Mental Health Practitioner Appointments

We are able offer patients face to face appointments with a Mental Health Practitioner at the Practice. Patients with anxiety or depression and who are not currently being treated by a mental health practitioner, can book in for an initial appointment. The nurse is also able to see patients who are on the waiting list for mental health services but have not yet been seen. Please contact a member of our reception team if you would like an appointment with our Mental Health Practitioner. Appointments are available on alternate Thursdays at Cressage.

Patient Online Access – Update to Services

From October 2022 there will be the facility for patients to book routine Doctors' appointments via Patient Online Access. Patients can book face to face appointment slots or telephone consultations slots online as well as by phone. Please note that when selecting telephone consultations that the location shown refers to where the clinician is based, and patients should not attend the surgery but await a phone call.

Patients with Patient Online Access can also continue to:

- · Order repeat medication
- View a summary of your medical records, including immunisation history

HOW TO GET YOUR COVID VACCINE BOOSTER

Covid booster jabs will be offered to everyone over the age of 50 sometime before the end of the year. Anyone over the age of 5 who has been identified as being at clinical risk, care home residents, and front-line health and social care staff will also be able to access a booster jab, as will anyone who cares for a vulnerable individual or someone with a weakened immune system.

GP surgeries are contacting people to let them know when their age group is eligible for the jab, and in some cases will be hosting vaccination clinics.

To check if you are eligible, and to make a vaccination appointment, there are several routes you can follow.

By going to www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/coronavirus-vaccination/ you can find out if you are currently able to access the vaccine, and book an appointment at a vaccination clinic.

If you would rather use a walk-in clinic, you can find details of Shropshire clinics at www.shropshiretelfordandwrekin.nhs.uk/your-health/covid/covid-19-vaccinations/drop-in/. Some clinics are offering first and second doses as well as boosters. Please note that these clinics are only open on specific days – details are available on the website.

Information on availability of vaccination clinics and a booking service are also available via the NHS app. Click on the 'advice' icon at the bottom of the home page and then select 'get advice about coronavirus'. The 'get a vaccine' option will then take you to a page where you can book an appointment or find a walk-in clinic.

If you would rather make an appointment by telephone, then you can call **119** free of charge.

A MESSAGE FROM ACTON BURNELL WI

Acton Burnell WI celebrates its 100th Anniversary on the 10th November and members are looking forward to a celebratory party. We are very sad to say that this will be our last meeting as we are closing down after the AGM on the 15th November, due to lack of membership and shortage of committee members. We would like to say a big thank you to all who have supported our events over the years and all members old and new who have worked very hard to keep us going. We have sadly reached the end of an era but we have many many special occasions to look back on.

DID YOU KNOW.....

Advent calendars were introduced to the UK as gifts from Germany and Scandinavia in the wake of the Second World War, as tokens of friendship. The first calendars were home produced by German Lutherans in the 19th century, and quickly became popular in Europe. Although the first chocolate advent calendar appeared in 1926 in Germany, the first UK version was only produced in 1958, and Cadbury came up with their first example in 1971, but they did not become the norm until the 1990s. Now as well as chocolate filled versions, you can get calendars featuring perfume, whiskey, cosmetics - you name it! Christmas stockings may now have been largely replaced with Christmas pillowcases or sacks, but Father Christmas originally popped down the chimney to fill children's own everyday socks, stockings or shoes. Specially designed and decorated stockings first appeared in the early 1800s. It is thought the tradition began when St Nicholas left some gold pieces by the chimney of an impoverished family who had three daughters, and one of the gold coins fell into a shoe left there. St Nicholas later became identified with Santa Claus,


and rather than the gifts being left on St Nicholas's Day (19th December), they became an important part of the Christmas celebrations.

The British eat around 800 million mince pies a year, but the little pies we scoff now are very different to the original medieval pie. The first mince pies contained rabbit, pigeon, partridge, hare and pheasant, as well as dried fruit and spices. Thirteen ingredients were often included to represent Jesus and the twelve disciples. They would have been made in a rectangular shape which was meant to resemble Jesus's cradle. Traditionally, people ate a pie on each of the 12 days of Christmas to guarantee good luck over the coming year. Over time, the type of meat included changed, from game to lamb, veal or tripe, and by the 19th century mince pies were usually made with minced beef. It was not until the Victorian era that all meat was removed and the pies became the sweet treat we love today.

On New Year's Day many of us will be making New Year's resolutions- more in hope than expectation in most cases! – but the idea of a new start in the new year goes back as far as the Ancient Babylonians, who would promise to repay their debts and return any

borrowed items in the hope that their gods would look favourably on them. The Romans had a similar practice, and in the Middle Ages knights would make a 'peacock vow' by placing their hands on a live or roasted peacock to promise to live up to their knightly values in the coming year.

New Year's resolutions appear to have become widespread by the 17th century, and by the 18th century writers were already making jokes about people's inability to keep their resolutions. It is estimated that today 80% of people break their resolutions by the first week of February, and only 8% of resolutions made actually get kept!



SHARE YOUR EXPERIENCES TO IMPROVE NHS CARE

If you or someone close to you has had experience in the last 12 months of being referred by your GP for tests, diagnosis or treatment, or if you expected or requested a referral but didn't get one, Healthwatch Shropshire would like to hear from you.

By completing a simple on-line form, you can help Healthwatch identify areas which are working well, and those which the NHS may need to improve. All information will be anonymised, and the overall findings will be published. The survey includes questions on health conditions, ethnicity, sexuality, financial security and education, but you can choose not to answer these.

A GP referral can be for a number of reasons, and can include a referral to a specialist, for an MRI, x-rays or scan, for treatment or for tests.

CHRISTMAS HEALTH SERVICE COVER

Most GP surgeries will be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and for the Bank Holiday on 27th December. If you have a medical concern during that time, please call NHS 111 by dialling **111** or use the online service at **111.nhs.uk**. This service is available 24/7 and can give immediate advice, direct you to a local service, connect you to a nurse, emergency dentist, pharmacist or GP. If necessary, you may be advised to go to A&E and may be given an arrival time to help cut down on the time you may spend waiting to be seen.

If you have a medical emergency, you should dial **999**. Emergencies may include loss of consciousness, repeated fits, chest pain, breathing difficulties, severe bleeding, serious burns or scalds, or a severe allergic reaction.

And a reminder that there are defibrillators available for use by the public at Acton Burnell Post Office, Pitchford Village Hall, Frodesley crossroads telephone kiosk and at Ruckly Home Farm. These can be used if you think, or suspect, that someone may be having a heart attack. Call **999** to alert the ambulance service before accessing the defibrillator.
